ADMINISTRATIVE ANNOUNCEMENTS

Dear Glade Families,

As we come close to the end of a calendar year, I want to wish you and your family continued prosperity and success in all aspects of your lives.

I also want to bring a couple of things to your attention that are worth repeating or pointing out anew:

- Please continue to refer to the school year calendar in the Gazette for all of the various events that will be happening in our school. Sometimes, previously scheduled events will need to be rescheduled and we will update these in the calendar in each month's Gazette. Also, some end of year dates are not yet finalized and will be published in this calendar once finalized.
- 2. Our primary students (pre-K-2nd grade) have been receiving instruction in a social emotional learning program called PATHS. Please ask your child about PATHS and what they are learning. Communicate any feedback or questions to your classroom teacher. The purpose of this program is to enable students to develop positive emotional regulation skills so that they can effectively engage with learning.
- If you are the parent of a current Pre-K student or will have a kindergarten student in Glade this coming year, please check out this excellent resource so you can help your child to be ready for school. It really is an excellent resource. <u>https://www.readyatfive.org/for-parents/parents-matter.html</u>. Enrollment for next year starts in March.
- 4. Our school improvement planning focuses on increasing the amount of meaningful independent reading that our students do, improving and expanding their vocabularies, and providing them with specific, timely, actionable feedback about where their efforts need to focus in reading, writing, and mathematics. There are several fundamental areas that our students continue to have difficulty with, and these are all areas that our parents can support with:
 - a. Demonstrating knowledge of basic math facts addition and subtraction by the end of 2nd grade, multiplication and division by the end of 4th grade. Currently, we have many students who are not yet proficient with math fact fluency. This creates a problem in mathematics learning as students with these missing skills struggle to complete basic computation and have difficulty with problem solving as a result. If your student has been identified for Reflex math, please make sure you are monitoring their practice and expecting their success.
 - b. Reading: you can support your child's learning by setting aside time each day for family reading. In this day and age of heavy screen time, student exposure to books and the cognitive development that reading brings, are very much in decline. Read beside your child or read a book together. It matters!
 - c. Talking to each other. Verbal communication skills are critical in developing effective writers and communicators. There is no more powerful way to encourage a child in their language skills than to teach them new vocabulary and language skills through conversation. It also allows us to slow down in this busy world and take the time to enjoy each other's company.

As always, these suggestions are offered in the spirit of helping our students to succeed. On rankings of our 37 elementary school in FCPS, we have progressed from 16th, to 13th, to most-recently 9th out of 37. Our goal this year is to be in the top 5. It will only happen if we put a more active focus on academic learning and the importance of reading, writing, and mathematics skills, while also encouraging our children to develop their artistic, musical, and athletic talents at the same time.

We will see you all for an amazing 2020. It will be the best year yet.

5 Ways to Keep Kids Learning Math Through the Holidays Try these fun and easy ways to keep the math learning alive over the holiday season.

Everyone is ready for a break from school when the winter holidays roll around. It's such a special time of year for families and friends, but it can also be a time of setbacks for some students. All the hard work towards building routines and establishing communities in the classroom can fall apart with a long break from school. A great way parents can help students not "forget" everything they have learned and create a seamless return in the New Year is to keep the routines going without feeling the pressure to get homework done and to be on a schedule. Below are some helpful hints for keeping the math alive over the holiday season in fun and easy ways.

<u>Create Surveys:</u> Children can create holiday surveys to collect data from family members at dinners and parties. Questions can range from holiday traditions to favorite gifts! Once kids have collected the data, they can create graphs (bar graph, pictograph, line plot) either on paper or online to display the results.

Travel: Many families travel over the holidays. Invite your children to become a part of the travel plans by using MapQuest or other resources to map out the best route to grandma's. They can estimate the time it would take and develop a schedule for the family according to holiday activities.

Holiday Toys: Children can research top holiday gifts from the years their parents or other relatives were kids. For example, find out the number one toy from 1975, how much it cost, and find the difference or price increase over the decades. This is a great way to incorporate many different curricula into one activity. Kids can make a report or poster to show their findings!

<u>Weather:</u> Everyone loves a White Christmas! How many times in the past 10, 20, or 50 years has it snowed on Christmas morning? Children can collect weather data on temperature, precipitation, and/or snowfall levels over the years.

How FCPS Decides to Cancel or Delay School During Bad Weather

Closing or delaying schools is a serious responsibility. A sudden change in a school schedule can create inconveniences and difficulties for many families. That's why we promise our community that FCPS will make the best and most informed decisions we can and that we'll communicate decisions as quickly and reliably as we can.

We evaluate many factors and sources of information as we work to make the most responsible decisions for our students and employees. Our main focus is always their safety. We also think about how a potential delay or closing might impact instructional time for our students.

With those things in mind, here's the process we follow to decide on a delay or closing:

FCPS' Transportation and Security and Emergency Management Departments receive regular updates from several sources (including county Emergency Management and state officials) to stay ahead of developing weather. We monitor weather by radar in real time and we talk to neighboring school districts about the conditions they're seeing.

On mornings when we have bad weather, FCPS Transportation employees fan out throughout the county before 4 AM to assess roads and sidewalks. At the same time, we contact county and state highway departments to hear their plans to clear roads. Senior FCPS administrators evaluate all of this information. The Superintendent decides--by 5 AM--if and when we can safely open schools and transport students.

Our Public Affairs Department then shares the Superintendent's decision. Through FindOutFirst, we email, text, tweet, and update our Facebook page. We post information on fcps.org and FCPS TV Comcast Channel 18. We also make individual phone calls to more than two dozen regional media outlets. These steps are typically completed within 30 minutes.

We think these are the most reasonable, practical and timely steps to make and communicate closing and delay decisions. That doesn't mean our decisions, in retrospect, are always perfect--weather and road conditions can change quickly. It does mean, though, that we always think through these decisions carefully and that student safety is our number one concern in making the best decisions with the information available at the time.

In the Event of Bad Weather or an Emergency... Here's How to Check School Status

Occasionally inclement weather or other safety or health conditions require FCPS to cancel, delay or otherwise change school routines or schedules. Typically, cancellation and delay decisions are made by 5 AM that day and announced soon after. If weather becomes a factor after school is in session, a decision to close early is made, whenever possible, by 10 AM that day. Very rarely, FCPS may be required to take student safety precautions immediately, with little or no notice. Although we notify many regional news outlets, we encourage parents and guardians to use the following sources for the most accurate news.

Delay Schedule for Half-Day Pre-K* On days when school opens 2 hours late, morning and afternoon pre-k* students attend 1½-hour sessions. Breakfast is served in morning classes, which start 2 hours late and dismiss 1 hour later than usual. Afternoon classes start 1 hour late and dismiss at the regular time.

Delay Schedule for CTC On days when school opens 2 hours late, morning Career & Technology Center classes start 2 hours late and dismiss about 1 hour later than usual. The afternoon session starts 40 minutes later than usual and dismisses at the regular time.

Early Dismissal When schools close <u>1 hour early</u> due to inclement weather, morning half-day programs follow their normal schedules, afternoon half-day pre-k*, afternoon CTC, Flexible Evening HS and Heather Ridge Twilight programs are canceled; CTC students remain at their home schools.

When schools close <u>2 hours early</u> due to inclement weather, morning half-day pre-k* students remain at school for dismissal with full-day students. Lunches are served. Afternoon half-day pre-k* and CTC programs are canceled; CTC students remain at their home schools. Flexible Evening HS and Heather Ridge Twilight programs are canceled.

When schools close <u>3 to 3.5 hours early</u> due to inclement weather, morning half-day pre-k* students remain at school for dismissal with full-day students, morning CTC students follow normal schedules, afternoon pre-k*, CTC, Flexible Evening HS and Heather Ridge Twilight programs are canceled.

Evening Activities School- and FCPS-sponsored afterschool/evening activities (sports, plays, BOE meetings, etc.) and evening instructional programs (such as Flexible Evening HS & the Twilight Program) are generally canceled on days when school is canceled or closes early.

En caso de mal tiempo o emergencia ... aquí se explica cómo verificar la situación escolar

En ocasiones, las inclemencias del tiempo u otras condiciones de seguridad o salud requieren que FCPS cancele, demore o cambie las rutinas u horarios escolares. Por lo general, las decisiones de cancelación y demora se toman antes de las 5 AM de ese día y se anuncian poco después. Si el clima se convierte en un factor determinante una vez que la escuela ya entró en sesión, se toma la decisión de cerrar temprano, siempre que sea posible, antes de las 10 AM de ese día. Muy raramente, se puede requerir que FCPS tome las precauciones de seguridad de los estudiantes de inmediato, con poca o ninguna notificación. Aunque notificamos a muchos medios de comunicación regionales, alentamos a los padres y tutores a utilizar las siguientes fuentes para obtener las noticias más precisas.

Horario de retraso para Pre-K * de medio día * En los días en que la escuela abre 2 horas tarde, los estudiantes de pre-kínder * de la mañana y de la tarde asisten a sesiones de 1½ hora. El desayuno se sirve en las clases de la mañana, que comienzan 2 horas tarde y terminan 1 hora más tarde de lo habitual. Las clases de la tarde comienzan 1 hora tarde y terminan a la hora regular.

Horario de retraso para CTC En los días en que la escuela abre 2 horas tarde, las clases matutinas del Career & Technology Center (Centro de Carrera y Tecnología) comienzan 2 horas tarde y terminan aproximadamente 1 hora más tarde de lo habitual. La sesión de la tarde comienza 40 minutos más tarde de lo habitual y termina a la hora habitual.

Salida temprana Cuando las escuelas cierran <u>1 hora antes</u> debido a las inclemencias del tiempo, los programas de medio día de la mañana siguen sus horarios normales. Los programas de pre-kínder de medio día por la tarde, CTC por la tarde, *Flexible Evening HS* y *Heather Ridge Twilight* se cancelan; los estudiantes de CTC permanecen en sus escuelas de origen.

Cuando las escuelas cierran <u>2 horas antes</u> debido al mal tiempo, los estudiantes de pre-kínder* de medio día del grupo de la mañana permanecen en la escuela para salir con los estudiantes de día completo. Se sirven almuerzos. Los programas de medio día de pre-kínder * y CTC se cancelan por la tarde; los estudiantes de CTC permanecen en sus escuelas de origen. Programas como *Flexible Evening HS* y *Heather Ridge Twilight* se cancelan.

Cuando las escuelas cierran de <u>3 a 3.5 horas antes</u> debido a las inclemencias del tiempo, los estudiantes de prekínder* de medio día de la mañana permanecen en la escuela para salir con los estudiantes de día completo; los estudiantes de CTC de la mañana siguen los horarios normales. El pre-kínder* de la tarde, CTC, programas como *Flexible Evening HS* y *Heather Ridge Twilight* se cancelan.

Actividades nocturnas Las actividades extracurriculares / nocturnas patrocinadas por la escuela y FCPS (deportes, juegos, reuniones BOE, etc.) y los programas de instrucción nocturna (como *Flexible Evening HS* y *Heather Ridge Twilight*) generalmente se cancelan los días en que la escuela se cancela o cierra temprano.

Other Important Reminders:

All absences, late arrivals, and early dismissals need a parent note or are unexcused. Be sure to include the child's first and last name and the teacher's name. Even if you have called the school to report an absence, we still require a note upon returning to school. For a copy of "A Note to School" please go to <u>http://ges.sites.fcps.org/attendance</u>. To review the entire FCPS policy, please visit page 38 of the FCPS Calendar Handbook.

<u>Address change</u>: Please provide a new proof of residency (a copy of a property tax bill, gas bill, electric bill, water/sewer bill or a signed current lease/rental agreement; NO phone/cable bills).

Custody change: If there is a change in child custody, please make sure you share that information with your child's teacher and the office. It is extremely important that a copy of the court document be delivered to the school and placed in the child's permanent record folder. Should the school not have this documentation, we have no recourse but to release your child to either parent upon request.

<u>Wellness–Food Use</u>: FCPS Wellness Regulation 400-82 states in part:

• For health and safety reasons, parents/visitors are only permitted to bring in food that is intended for consumption by their individual student.

• For health and safety reasons, students are only permitted to bring in food for personal consumption.

<u>Weapons:</u> Possession of any firearm or other weapon by a student on school property is strictly forbidden. This also includes look-alike weapons. The penalties for violation are detailed in the Discipline section of the FCPS handbook. Please remember it is a serious offense to possess a weapon of any kind on school property.

Bus Transportation

Students may ride only the school bus to which they are assigned. Inviting friends to ride the bus home is sometimes problematic as some busses are extremely crowded and over capacity. In an emergency situation only, both students are required to have a parent note. This note must be signed by parents. Drivers will not transport any student without a note and/or on their bus roster. Please note that some notes may not be approved due to overcrowding. Thank you for your understanding and cooperation.

Outside Activities During Cold Weather – Elementary Guidelines:

It is difficult to set guidelines that fit every circumstance and condition with regards to outside activities during cold weather. Regulation No. 400-42 was most recently updated in 2018 to include weather charts and detailed information to assist in the decision making process. The link can be found at https://apps.fcps.org/legal/doc.php?number=400-42 Principals use their discretion and good judgment as to whether or not students will go outside, as well as the duration of the outside activity. Sometimes we may opt for a shorter recess period in cold temperatures or specify a temperature above 20 degrees as the cut off point for going out. Elementary students should not go outdoors for recess or physical education whenever the temperature falls below 20 degrees, including the wind chill factor. The temperature cut off at Glade is 22 degrees, so please remember to dress your student in the appropriate clothing (labeled coat, hat and gloves). We will honor parent's reasonable requests that a student be allowed to stay indoors.



MEDICATIONS IN SCHOOL: ALL medications to be taken at school, whether prescription or non - prescription (over-the-counter), **must** have a Medication Authorization form completed by the child's health care provider and parent. This form is available from the Health Room Staff and at <u>www.fcps.org</u>. This form along with the medication, in a properly labeled prescription bottle or the

original unopened over-the-counter bottle or package, must be given directly to the Health Room Staff by the parent/guardian. FCPS Regulation 400-23 states students are not permitted to carry medications to and from school.

When Should I keep my child home?

Please keep your child home if these symptoms present and if these symptoms persist for more than 24 hours, contact your child's health care provider. If your child comes to the health room complaining of such you will be called to possibly pick he/she up from school. Important Signs of Illness:

- Temperature greater than or equal to 100 degrees
- Nausea or Vomiting
- Stomachache
- Diarrhea
- Pale or flush face
- Headache
- Persistent cough
- Earache
- Thick discharge from nose
- Sore throat
- Rash or skin infection
- Red or pink eyes
- Loss of appetite
- Loss of energy or decrease in activity

Please keep your child home from school for <u>24 hours</u> after the last episode of vomiting, fever, and/or diarrhea. If these symptoms persist for more than 24 hours, you should contact your child's health care provider.
