Message from our Administration

Hi everyone.

I hope you and your families are well as we enter the second half of term three! While spring is just around the corner, first and foremost in our minds are your children's health and safety. Though as I write this there have been no confirmed cases of coronavirus in Maryland, flu, cold, and intestinal viruses are still very prevalent in our area. Our custodians have been diligently sanitizing desks and other surfaces of the school to ensure transmission of germs is less likely. Thanks in advance for helping us in these efforts by keeping your students home if they are ill until they have been fever-free (or have not vomited) for 24 hours.

On another topic, I want to share with you that we reminded students on the announcements this week that phones, headphones, earbuds, and airpods are not permitted to be used between 7:50 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. in school. While these items can be carried, they should be away and out of sight during the school day. This is the same policy that is becoming widely used in many other Frederick County middle schools. The purpose for this guideline is for safety (students with headphones can't hear directions) and increased student focus, as well as decreasing the amount of drama throughout the school day that messaging and social media bring, which is disruptive to everyone. We appreciate your help with reiterating the importance of this school guideline.

As always, please let us know if there is anything that we can do to assist you and your students to make sure that they're successful--we're grateful for the opportunity to partner with you!

Maryland Officials Warn Parents of Latest Social Media Video "Challenge"

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The Maryland Center for School Safety (MCSS) and the Maryland Institute for Emergency Medical Services Systems (MIEMSS) would like to warn parents of a recent social media video challenge called the "Skull Breaker Challenge." Serious head injuries have resulted.

The "challenge" has been disseminated on the app TikTok. In the "challenge" a student is asked to jump, and then another person kicks the legs out from underneath jumper, who falls to the ground. This behavior is very dangerous and can lead to serious injury. Emergency Medical Services (EMS) professionals are first on the scene to see these preventable injuries. Officials from MIEMSS say they can range from broken bones to devastating head injuries. Unfortunately, head injuries can have life-altering, permanent disabling consequences.

Parents are encouraged to speak with their children about the dangers of this and other social media challenges that can seriously harm their child and to have a discussion on safe social media use at school and at home.

Food Delivery

We have had an increase in students having food delivered from fast food restaurants and families bringing students food from these places during the school day. We will no longer permit this. The office is an incredibly busy place during the school day and can no longer coordinate delivery of

these orders on a daily basis. In the event a student forgets a lunch at home, it must be brought to school in a student lunchbox or brown bag.

In addition, students may not carry around food to share with friends on special occasions, such as a box of donuts on one's birthday. FCPS Regulation No. 400-82 states that for health and safety reasons, parents/visitors are only permitted to bring in food that is intended for consumption by their individual student. Students are only permitted to bring in food for their own personal consumption.






Language Arts Department

We will read multiple texts that explore the focus question: How does a country respond to the death of a leader?

Math Department Updates

Science Department News

Students learn science by acquiring knowledge and constructing explanations of natural phenomena. Then they test those explanations

and communicate their findings both in oral and written forms. Through this process, students develop a deep understanding of science that combines knowledge and facts with reasoning and critical thinking.

At every grade in middle school, students will complete four units of scientific study. Below are content updates from all three grade levels.

Grade 6

Sixth grade students are finishing up the Balanced Body unit with the nervous system. Students are learning the different types of sensory receptors and the types of inputs to which they respond (e.g., electromagnetic, mechanical, chemical stimuli) and the way that sensory information is transmitted along nerve cells from receptors to the brain.

Background Information:

The nervous system receives information about what is happening both inside and outside your body. It also directs the way in which your body responds to this information. Your nervous system can take an immediate action or store the information as a memory.

The three main structures in the nervous system are the **nerves**, **spinal cord**, and **brain**. The nerves receive a signal or stimulus from the environment. Nerves are found all over your body and can sense many different types of stimuli. For example, the nerves in your skin can sense pressure and temperature, while nerves in your tongue respond to chemical stimuli. Some of your nerves even respond to electrical stimuli! Once an impulse is sensed it is then transferred to the spinal cord, the spinal cord takes the message to the brain. In the brain the message is interpreted and response is selected. For example when your body needs fluids you get thirsty. This response is carried down the spinal cord to the body so that you can respond to the stimulus, and take a drink of water. The time it takes the stimulus/reaction to make this trip is known as reaction time.

Key vocabulary and concepts:

Nerves - Connects to your spinal cord to deliver messages to your brain

Spinal Cord - Connects your nerves to your brain

Brain - Processes messages sent from spinal cord for response

Adrenaline - Chemical that is produced when under stress

Pain - Unpleasant feeling in your tissue

Making connections in nerves - Why we get better at reactions the more they happen

Seeing, Feeling, Hearing, Touching, Tastings - Ways we get information to our brain

Chunking - Combining info to help you remember easier

Long Term Memory - Can last FOREVER

Short Term Memory - Lasts only 15-30 seconds

Nervous - System that process messages to your brain and back to your nerves

Hippocampus - Stores memories and emotions

Grade 7

Seventh grade students have moved into Earth's Processes. Students are working with the rock cycle, have conducted a sinkhole experiment, and are working in the Jason Project to address the following core idea:

All Earth processes are the result of energy flowing and matter cycling within and among the
planet's systems. This energy is derived from the sun and Earth's hot interior. The energy that
flows and matter that cycles produce chemical and physical changes in Earth's materials and
living organisms.

Grade 8

Eighth grade students have started their work in the Motions unit with Newton's laws of motion. Students have carried out several labs to reinforce these concepts.

Below are two important core ideas for these standards:

- The motion of an object is determined by the sum of the forces acting on it; if the total force on
 the object is not zero, its motion will change. The greater the mass of the object, the greater the
 force needed to achieve the same change in motion. For any given object, a larger force causes a
 larger change in motion.
- For any pair of interacting objects, the force exerted by the first object on the second object is equal in strength to the force that the second object exerts on the first, but in the opposite direction (Newton's third law).
