

- As we move into the spring, we want to make sure families pay attention to updates from classroom teachers regarding testing windows. For students in 3<sup>rd</sup>-5<sup>th</sup> grades MCAP (MD State Assessments for Reading and Math) testing days are quickly approaching. These dates are shared with families so you are able to prepare students for changes in schedules, as needed. At school all teachers are continuing to work with students to help ensure that they are all fully versed in their accommodations. We encourage families to review their child's IEP accommodations with them, and discuss the benefits of using all of their approved accommodations. Together we can work to ensure that students are utilizing all of the accommodations that have been set forth in their IEP.

# **Speech Therapy**

#### This past month:

In March, students worked on speech and language activities centered around topics such as Fairytales, Spring Time, and St. Patrick's Day. They completed St, Patrick Day and spring related crafts. Students listened to stories such as *How to Catch a Leprechaun* and *Jack and The Bean Stalk as Told by the Giant*. While listening they practiced words using their speech sounds, worked on learning new vocabulary, described pictures, and retold the story.

#### This month:

Students will be focusing on using speech and language in rain forest and more springtime activities. Stories this month will include *I Don't Want to be a Frog* and *If I Ran the Rainforest*.

#### At home:

At home, you and your child could work on describing how their environment and what is beginning to grow again outside. Topics of discussion could include what they want to do for Spring break or what they have seen growing outside. A fun activity at home could be making homemade sensory buckets or doing a nature scavenger hunt- these would be good activities to work on answering questions and describing items.
