Principal's Message

March was a tremendous month at Windsor Knolls Middle School with our students and staff achieving and performing at extremely high levels embodying our mantra of "Be Your Best!"

It's difficult to even put into words the amazing show that Mrs. Martinez-Trawick and our students performed the first weekend in March. In front of a packed house for three shows, our cast and crew performed Moana Jr. with all the skill, expertise, and passion of future actors and stage hands. I don't think it was lost on anyone that it had been since 2019 that our kids were able to perform in-person. It was a very special weekend for sure. Kudos to all of our staff and students who contributed to such an entertaining musical.

Throughout the month, Mr. Skopek's band and orchestra students attended their adjudication festivals. Each grade level band performed quite well. The 8th-grade band received superior ratings from all 3 adjudicators and only missed a perfect overall score by 2 points. The 6th grade and 7th grade bands also performed at high levels. Both ensembles also received superior ratings from all adjudicators and missed a totally perfect score by only 1 point. The WKMS orchestra also performed quite well earning a superior rating from each of the judges. Well done to Mr. Skopek and all of our musicians.

The WKMS Math Counts Team participated in the county meet in January advancing twelve of our over forty mathletes to the Regional competition in February. Of those competitors, three mathletes advanced to the State competition at the which was held last evening. We should have the results of the State competition in the upcoming days. No matter the outcome, we are very proud of all of our mathletes, but happier yet that so many students are enjoying math beyond the classroom as WKMS boasts the largest team in Frederick County. Congratulations to Mrs. Gallagher, Mrs. Wurster, and all of our mathletes.

The WKMS Archery Team competed in the MD State NASP Bullseye Tournament in Westminster, MD on March 18th and 19th. Students from all over the state in grades 4 - 12 competed. Students were ranked by elementary, middle and high school levels. Of the 60 students on our team, 55 competed, and 10 of them were among the top scorers in the State shooting at 10 meter and 15 meter distances. Congratulations to Mrs. Conlon, Mr. Burkey, Mrs. Donohue and all of our archers who participated in this competition.

Lastly, several students from Mrs. Lindstrom's Life Skills and Mrs. Clark's Tech Ed classes performed exceedingly well in the recent FCPS Tech Fair. We had several students recognized for their achievements in a variety of categories such as "All Wound Up", "Hunger Games" and "Cupcake Challenge".

I would be remiss if I did not also share briefly on the events that have occurred in the FCPS community last month. As most of you are aware, the actions of a few students have caused significant safety concerns and disruptions within some of our schools. My heart goes out to the students, staff, and families who have been impacted by the negative, dangerous, and hateful actions of a small portion of our community. As a WKMS community, our primary responsibility and obligation is to ensure that our students have a safe and welcoming school in which they can focus on learning. Our staff has reaffirmed our pledge to work for a school community that is safe and welcoming to all students. While our staff works diligently to create this environment, we must also be open to our students and families. If you see or hear of behaviors or actions contrary to this commitment, you are encouraged to speak with any staff member. If you would like to speak with someone, please know that we are here for you. If you become aware of a threat or potential safety concern after school hours, please never hesitate to contact the Frederick County Sheriff's Office. Lastly, please be sure to monitor your student's cell phone should they have one and their social media if they have an on-line presence. Unfortunately, many of the issues we confront at school originate from and are compounded by social media.

State Assessments and Accountability

Students are participating in state assessments this spring! Their performance on these assessments, along with other school data, will assist schools in planning educational programs for students.

While Spring 2020 and Spring 2021 brought a hiatus from state assessments, federal accountability requirements are now upon us again for Spring 2022. The Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) will be publicly reporting each schools' Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) accountability data. This reporting affects all FCPS schools and includes individual score reports for students in grades 3-8, as well as high school students.

Specific to high school students, the Maryland Blueprint for education is one driver of new assessment requirements. It is important that students and families are informed. For the remaining school year, students enrolled in Algebra I, English 10, Government, or Biology must have taken the test in order to graduate. But next school year, requirements for these assessments change. Algebra I and English 10 will become College and Career Readiness (CCR) requirements, while Biology and Government will become end-of-course assessments that count toward 20% of a student's final course grade. The shift in use of the Biology and Government scores comes from the MSDE.

As we are starting the last term of this school year, parents can see their student's math progress this year easily in a simple pie chart using our self-paced, individualized, interactive math platform - ALEKS. Every student has a personal account that tracks their progress on grade level standards. Our goal, as shared with students at the beginning of the year, was to work towards completing their pie. Parents can see students' progress by having their child log into their school Google account, go to FCPS Bookmarks, select Clever Portal, click the red McGraw Hill badge, then click the rainbow ALEKS pie icon to see how much progress your student has made thus far this year. Students are given time daily in ELT to work towards completing their ALEKS pathway as well as it being accessible outside of school hours. Should your student want or need additional math support there are several options for math tutoring.
